Our firm, Arbor Trust Wealth Advisors, LLC, is registered as an investment adviser with the U.S. Securities and Exchange Commission. Brokerage and investment advisory services and fees differ and it is important for you to understand these differences. Relationships and Services

What investment services and advice can you provide me?
<p>Services: We offer investment advisory services to retail investors. These services include investment management and financial planning. Our investment management services may also include trust fiduciary services provided through Tri-Star Trust Bank, a third-party. We work closely with you to identify your investment goals and objectives, as well as risk tolerance and financial situation in order to create a portfolio strategy.</p>
<p>Accounts, Investments, and Monitoring: We provide services to individual, joint, retirement, trust and estate accounts. We primarily construct portfolios consisting of individual equity securities, individual fixed income securities, mutual funds, and/or exchange-traded funds. In certain circumstances, we may also employ limited partnerships, real estate investment trusts and other types of investments, as appropriate. We do not make available or offer advice with respect to proprietary products or a limited menu of products or types of investments. As part of our services, we monitor portfolios and securities in accounts on a regular and continuous basis. We also meet with you at least annually, or more frequently, depending on your needs.</p>
<p>Investment Authority: We provide our services on a perpetual and discretionary basis. We execute investment recommendations in accordance with your investment objectives without your prior approval of each specific transaction. Our engagement will continue until you notify us otherwise in writing.</p>
<p>Account Minimums & Other Requirements: We do not require an account or relationship size minimum in order for you to open/maintain an account or establish a relationship. However, Tri-Star Trust Bank generally requires a relationship minimum of \$300,000.</p>

Fees, Costs, Conflicts, and Standard of Conduct

What fees will I pay?
<p>Asset-Based Fees: Our asset-based fee ranges from 0.60% up to 1.75% annually based on a tiered schedule and the scope of services. We do impose a minimum relationship fee of \$4,200 per year. This fee is collected on a quarterly basis and calculated as a percentage of the value of the cash and investments in your account[s] that we manage. This presents a conflict of interest as we are financially incentivized to encourage you to place more assets in your advisory account as you will pay more in advisory fees.</p>
<p>Hourly Fees: If applicable, our hourly fees for financial planning and consulting are at a rate ranging from \$200 to \$400 per hour. We collect fees in up to two separate installments. Hourly fees are negotiable based on the nature and complexity of the services to be provided and the overall relationship with us. We will provide you with an estimate for total hours and overall costs prior to engaging us for these services.</p>
<p>Fixed Fees: If applicable, our fixed project-based fees for financial planning and consulting range from \$2,500 to \$5,000. We collect fees in up to two separate installments Fixed fees are negotiable based on the nature and complexity of the services to be provided and the overall relationship with us. We will provide you with an estimate of the total cost prior to engaging us for these services.</p>

Other Fees & Costs: In addition to our advisory fee, you will also be responsible for custody fees, account administrative fees, fees and expenses related to mutual funds and exchange traded funds, and applicable securities transaction fees.

Additional Information: You will pay fees and costs whether you make or lose money on your investments. Fees and costs will reduce any amount of money you make on your investments over time. Please make sure you understand what fees and costs you are paying. What are your legal obligations to me when acting as my investment adviser? How else does your firm make money and what conflicts of interest do you have?

When we act as your investment adviser, we have to act in your best interest and not put our interests ahead of yours. At the same time, the way we make money creates some conflicts with your interests. You should understand and ask us about these conflicts because they can affect the investment advice we provide you. Here is an example to help you understand what this means.

Some of our financial professionals are licensed as insurance agents. Implementation of insurance recommendations are separate and apart from a financial professional’s role with Arbor Trust. Although these persons do not plan to sell insurance products, a financial professional may receive commissions and other related revenues from various insurance companies if their products are sold. A financial professional is not required to offer the products of any particular insurance company. If generated, commissions from insurance sales do not offset financial planning or regular advisory fees, but will be excluded from asset calculations for investment management services. This creates a conflict of interest in recommending certain products of any insurance company.

How do your financial professionals make money?

Certain of our financial professionals are compensated based on an annual salary. Our other financial professionals are compensated based on the revenue generated from the accounts serviced by the firm. This means financial professionals have an incentive to increase the asset size in the relationship or solicit new business, taking time away from the day-to-day servicing of current clients.
